To Whom It May Concern:

I am pleased to write in support of the application by Natalie Damjanovich-Napoleon for a Creative Australia grant for her project "Axe Marks in Tree Trunks". I have known Natalie for many years, firstly as an undergraduate in my classes at The University of Western Australia; later when she worked at the University in an administrative role, in the same section as my wife; and in more recent years through our participation in the Perth writing community. This community is very strong – Western Australian poetry is thriving – and Natalie is a key part of it, as a writer, an organiser of readings, and a teacher. In all this time and in all these roles I have known her to be intelligent, conscientious and purposeful. I taught hundreds of students during my academic career and inevitably I have forgotten most of them, but I always remembered her.

These qualities, as well as her social conscience, are reflected in the project she is pursuing, and this funding would give her the opportunity to spend her time doing what she does best, which is write exquisite poetry. Natalie has enough writing and publishing experience to know what she is doing, and her creation of poems about and partly in the voices of pioneer Croatian women marks something new for her and for Western Australian poetry altogether. She has found an ingenious way of entering the lives of these women, obviously drawing on her own experience but doing much more than that to empathise with their lives and as yet untold experiences in a new land. I have offered to work with Natalie and edit her collection upon completion. The quoted fee is \$500 for editing a 100-page collection with \$250 given in-kind to assist an emerging writer.

Natalie is an honest and conscientious person, and this shows through in her writing. I can guarantee that any grant she is given will be put to good use. As can be recognised from her life as it is, she knows how to make the most of limited time. She is a poet who is very worthy of this funding.

I am pleased to offer my support to this application by Natalie Damjanovich-Napoleon, also known as Natalie D-Napoleon, for funding for an Arts Project for an Individual via Creative Australia, for her poetry project 'Axe Marks in Tree Trunks'. I worked with Natalie as Associate Supervisor to her doctoral studies in Creative Writing at Edith Cowan University, which she commenced in 2019 and completed in 2024, and she teaches in the undergraduate major in Creative and Professional Writing, where I am coordinator. She was the recipient of a prestigious RTP Scholarship to support her doctoral research.

Natalie is an innovative and dynamic poet working in an avant-garde form and engaging with little-known historical and archival material which reveals truths about the lives of Croatian immigrants to Western Australia. These histories have been neglected, especially those of women, and Natalie's poetry is important work intent on capturing this material while the cultural memory of post-war European migrants is still somewhat intact. In this respect, her project is time sensitive and will benefit considerably from this funding to complete her project, which will also contribute to her pursuit of a sustainable artistic career.

I highly recommend Natalie Damjanovich-Napoleon for a grant for Arts Projects for Individuals. This project will forward her career and increase understanding of the challenges faced by non-English speaking migrant women, currently a gap in the nation's literary heritage. She is an experienced poet with a clear direction, a publishing track record and a strong work ethic so this opportunity will undoubtedly produce a unique and valuable body of work.
